

This month is the first in a set of three articles on three big questions – belonging, identity, and

purpose - that we face as we go through transitions in life. Youth and young adults in particular are dealing with these questions all the time – both because they are facing them for the first time, and because they experience transition almost constantly.

Belonging

Here's an interesting thought experiment: When in your life have you felt the most joyful or contented?

Perhaps your mind went to a particular group of people: maybe a group of friends who you spent time with, or family members who have known you your whole life. For these people, it's almost like it doesn't matter when or where we see them, we know we belong with them and can be ourselves around them.

Or maybe your mind went to a place: perhaps a longtime home, or a place of peace or excitement. Some of you might be thinking of an ice fishing shack or hunting stand; others, the home you grew up in or the place you raised a family. In these spaces, we find joy and contentedness just by being there, and it's only made more special when others share that space with us.

What do these answers have in common? I think they make us feel joyful or contented because they make us feel like we belong. For me, my mind harkens back to my time in campus ministry. This isn't always the case, but the Lutheran church at my college in North Carolina had a dedicated space for college students, with had space to study, eat, or hang out. And even though the spring break service trips were fun and the worship services were meaningful, what made the place special for me was the fact that I could spend so much time with other people who knew me. It was a place to belong.

Belonging is perhaps the biggest questions that young people face; when we find a place to belong, our other questions are much easier to answer. But it's hard for and for youth to find that place. Teams or clubs or bands can offer that for a season, but then they must find it again somewhere else. Family is often the first place we belong, but teenagers also are pushing the limits and trying to find their own place in the world as a burgeoning independent adult.

The bad news is that nationwide we are failing to help young people find places to belong. Rates of loneliness have increased every year since 2012 (and this is true for almost every age group, not just for teenagers). And about 20 percent of teens report that they don't have even one adult that they can rely on or go to.

But there's good news for us, too, and we find it in the gospel: we belong to Jesus. And because we

belong to Jesus, we also belong to each other.

Yes, church is often messy. Yes, it's not always exciting for teenagers or adults. But at our best, for teenagers and adults alike, we can be a place to belong.

Here's two things to remember:

- 1. Whether you're a parent, a grandparent, or a young person yourself, remember that the question of belonging is always bubbling under the surface. Help youth ask the right question and find places to belong.
- 2. Belonging matters, no matter what stage of life we're in.

This month, I pray that you know that you belong – body, heart, and soul – with Jesus!

Synod Reflections

"New Year's Reflection" By Deacon Colleen Bernu

"Thus says the Lord, who makes a way in the sea, a path in the mighty waters, who brings out chariot and horse, army and warrior; they lie down, they cannot rise, they are extinguished, quenched like a wick: Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert. The wild animals will honor me, the jackals and the ostriches; for I give water in the wilderness, rivers in the desert, to give drink to my chosen people, the people whom I formed for myself so that they might declare my praise." (Isaiah 43:16-21)

Traditionally, Ojibwe people don't report age in years. Instead, we share the number of winters that we've experienced. Winter creates harsh environments, and in the old days, not everyone would greet spring as a result. So, regardless of the month in which you were born, your life was measured by winters. In our traditional stories, winter is personified as a fierce, old warrior who tends to ignore the big picture, focusing primarily on personal desire and selfish outcome. He creates an environment that promotes solitude. His breath changes our landscape so that travel is difficult, extended time outdoors can be dangerous, and food sources are scarce. In response, Ojibwe gather together through storytelling, pausing, renewing

communal identity, and reflecting on what it means to be Anishinaabeg, the people, living in this time and this place. Winter, thus, inadvertently creates a thin space, a place where the distance between the physical and spiritual worlds collapses and we exist more balanced in both our realities - our physical, human self and our spiritual self - in order for us to better hear the voice and invitation of God. Through Isaiah, God speaks to the Israelites, demanding that they pause in order to renew their communal identity, reminding them of their history, and inviting them to reflect on what it means to be a people who have committed to walk intimately with God. In these words, God reminds us that God is ever present and always working. Because God has created this world, God has tended to it and will continue to do so into the future - our invitation is to recognize God at work, embrace the possibilities this creates, and partner with God in a way so that others can see God at work, too. Twenty-five times we are assured through our stories of faith that God is about to do a new thing (eleven times through the prophets; three times through the Psalms and Lamentations; eight

times in the letters/epistles, and twice in Revelations). In the midst of all that is our lived experiences, it's good to be reminded that God is with us, preparing something new. Like winter, we sometimes become narrow focused and live our lives individually under our own terms. Yet, God again and again reminds us of God's promises of renewal and rebirth, so that when they present themselves, we are ready and willing to partner with God to bring these new things to life. May we take this winter season as an opportunity to prepare ourselves for spring. May we embrace this season of change and uncertainty, confident that God is with us ready and able to do a new thing in our midst. May we never forget that we are a community in partnership with God; we are never alone. Happy New Year, my siblings in Christ. I am excited to see what God will do in and through you in 2023.

Our Daily Bread Ministries

Lost, Found, Joy

Rejoice with me; I have found my lost sheep. Luke 15: 6 "They call me 'the ringmaster.' So far this year I've found 167 lost rings." During a walk on the beach with my wife, Cari, we struck up a conversation with an older man who was using a metal detector to scan an area just below the surf line. "Sometimes rings have names on them," he explained, "and I love seeing their owners' faces when I return them. I post online and check to see if anyone contacted lost and found. I've found rings missing for years." When we mentioned that I enjoy metal detecting as well but didn't do it frequently, his parting words were, "You never know unless you go!" We find another kind of "search and rescue" in Luke 15. Jesus was criticized for caring about people who were far from God (vv. 1-2). In reply, He told three stories about things that were lost and then found a sheep, a coin, and a son. The man who finds the lost sheep "joyfully puts it on his shoulders and goes home. Then he calls his friends and neighbors together and says, 'Rejoice with me'" (vv. 5–6). All the stories are ultimately about finding lost people for Christ, and the joy that comes as they're found in Him.

Jesus came "to seek and to save the lost" (19:10), and He calls us to follow Him in loving people back to God (see Matthew 28:19). The joy of seeing others turn to Him awaits. We'll never know unless we go.

Scripture Insight

Tax collectors were seen as betraying their people by colluding with the Roman government. Many tax collectors abused their role by taking more money than required for taxes and keeping the surplus for themselves (Luke 3: 12-13). Scholars aren't sure what specifically caused people to be labeled "sinners"

(15: 1), but these persons too would have been excluded from the religious community.

Luke portrays these social and religious outcasts sympathetically. Tax collectors came to John the Baptist eager to know how to repent (3: 12). Jesus called Levi the tax collector to follow Him, and Levi immediately did, then hosted a banquet for Him (5: 27-30). A woman the Pharisees described as a sinner (7:39) is praised by Christ for her faith (v. 50). Luke argued that those who know they're sinners are most likely to hear and follow Jesus (5: 31-32; 15: 1). Monica LaRose
