

On Listening

We know when we've been listened to – and when we haven't.

Recently, I had a couple of stark reminders of the difference listening can make.

One was with a group of fellow new pastors from across the country. One of our leaders, a pastor for three decades, had plenty of wisdom to share, but in practice, he was actually a lousy listener. To be clear, he wasn't rude or overbearing, but despite his profession, when one of us in the first-call learning group shared something difficult or heavy, he often responded with a story or with "wisdom" rather than asking the person to go deeper. Because of that, no matter how wise his words were, none of us really felt like taking in the lessons of his experience. His failure to show that he was listening stilted the group's growth and hindered our closeness.

On the other hand, good listening can make all the difference. In our weekly local Bible study group with one other pastor and three SAMs (Synodically Authorized Ministers – people who aren't pastors but who preach at small congregations), one SAM had just come back from a life-threatening surgery. He told us about his accident and how he was trying to make sense of the whole ordeal. Ultimately, this group colleagues listened to him, asked him good questions, and left space for his thoughts and feelings. It was beautiful to experience, and, unlike my first-call group, we grew closer because of the experience.

Listening is so important in all our relationships, from our partners, parents, and kids to our workplace colleagues, friends – even our enemies!

Here's a few possible benefits of good listening:

- Learning
- Conflict Resolution
- Real Apologies and Real Forgiveness
- Deepened Relationships

This is all true for churches, too! We know how important it is to listen deeply and listen well to each other. But what's less natural for us is to listen to our neighbors.

It's no secret that the institutional church – and that's the whole church, not just the mainline – is changing. Generations from baby boomers to my own generation to teenagers today are all engaging less with institutions, spending more time alone, and choosing less often to associate with a local church.

There's good news, however, and that is that God is always active, calling people

to faith and to discipleship. So the church's job in this long season of change is to listen deeply: to God, and to our neighbors.

Ultimately, deep listening is what might allow the church, both here in Carlton and across North America, to reconnect with generations that aren't finding their way into the walls of the church.

This year, may you find ways to listen, and to be listened to. And if nothing else, know that God listens to you and knows your deepest needs, no matter what.

A stipend of \$500.00 will be given to those interested in becoming a camp counselor and less if you would be a counselor in training. Becoming a camp counselor helps build good leadership skills.

We had 6 kids along with Pastor Seth and Wendy attend all youth gathering at Craguns. The kids had a fun time.

March 18, 2023, in Grand Rapids, MN, will be Cardia Deo. For those interested in attending, we could offer a hotel room on Saturday night to debrief and bond with others. More to come.

Recycle your Holiday Lights

CARLTON, MN - If you have unwanted or no longer working holiday lights, please recycle them at the Carlton County Transfer Station located at 1950 Highway 210. The program provides FREE holiday lights recycling. Electric cords are also accepted. The year-round hours for the Carlton County Transfer Station are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. For efficient recycling, remove all decorations from your string lights. Remove them from any type of plastic spool, cardboard packaging, or plastic bags. Place the clean string lights in the correct box at the Transfer Station. Rope lights are acceptable. Acceptable electric cords include extension cords, appliance cords, and telephone cords. The material will be processed at a recycling facility to separate the recyclable metal materials. The Carlton County Transfer Station offers solid waste disposal and recycling services to Carlton County residents. Disposal services available for a fee include household garbage and construction/demolition material. Recycling services for a fee include mattresses, brush, tires, electronics, and appliances. Recycling services available to county residents without a fee include household recyclables, food waste, grass and yard clippings, oil and oil filters, antifreeze, batteries, fluorescent bulbs, medical sharps, and scrap metal. The household hazardous

waste facility is closed for the season and will re-open May 2023. Area residents with questions about the Transfer Station can call the Zoning and Environmental Services Office at 218-384-9176. For more information visit https://www.co.carlton.mn.us/580/Trans fer-Station

When You're Afraid

When the angel of the Lord appeared to Gideon, he said, "The Lord is with you, mighty warrior." Judges 6: 12

I had a medical checkup scheduled, and although I'd had no recent health concerns I dreaded the visit. I was haunted by memories of an unexpected diagnosis long ago. While I knew God was with me and I should simply trust Him, I still felt afraid. I was disappointed in my fear and lack of faith. If God was always with me, why was I feeling such anxiety? Then one morning I believe He led me to the story of Gideon. Called "mighty warrior" (Judges 6: 12), Gideon was fearful over his assignment to attack Midianites. Although God had promised him His presence and victory, Gideon

still sought multiple reassurances (vv. 16-23, 36-40). However, God didn't condemn Gideon for his fear. He understood him. On the night of the attack, He assured Gideon again of victory, even giving him a way to assuage his fears (7: 10-11). God understood my fear too. His reassurance gave me the courage to trust Him. I experienced His peace, knowing that He was with me regardless of the outcome. In the end, my checkup was uneventful. We have a God who understands our fears and who reassures us through the Scriptures and the Spirit (Psalm 23: 4: John 14: 16-17). May we worship Him in thankfulness, just as Gideon Did (Judges 7: 15) By Karen Huang

Reflect & Pray

What fears of challenges are you facing? How does it help to know that God is with you and wants to help you?

Dear God, thank You for not condemning my fears, but always reassuring me of Your presence. Help me turn to You when I'm afraid and trust in You.

Scripture Insight

At the time of the events in Judges 7, Gideon was still an obscure figure. The Midianite army had heard nothing of his military prowess, for he hadn't yet accomplished anything. The angel's words back in Judges 6 were key to his eventual success: "The LORD is with you" (v. 12). The enemy soldier's dream and its interpretation were also direct evidence of God's intervention in the life of His people Israel (7:13–14). But every step of the way, Gideon struggled to believe it. At last, upon hearing his name on the lips of the enemy, he gained full confidence (v. 15).


